Grants In Action

Forklift for Catholic Social Services

As part of our Community Grants program, the Hastings Community Foundation awarded \$8,000 to Catholic Social Services for the purchase of a forklift to aid in food distribution. In 2021, the CSS distributed 205 tons of food from their truck to the Hastings community and to 17 food pantries across south central and southwest Nebraska.

HCF Partners with Key Society for Record \$150,000 Grant

It is the single largest grant made by the Hastings Community Foundation.

The HCF Grants Committee partnered with the Key Society to make a \$150,000 gift to the Hastings Family YMCA's "Building What Matters" campaign. The project includes a complete renovation and expansion of the 16th Street YMCA facility and the selling of their 18th Street location.

"The HCF went way above and beyond with their gift to our capital campaign," said Troy Stickles, CEO of the Hastings Family YMCA. "It's humbling when organizations like the HCF stretch their gift beyond what they normally do, because it shows the value they see in our organization and our community as a whole. We are very grateful for their generosity." $\,$

In addition to being the largest grant from the Hastings Community Foundation, this represents the first time the HCF Grants Committee and Key Society combined their efforts.

"We knew this YMCA project was an important one for our community," said Dan Peters, executive director of Hastings Community Foundation. "Our Grants Committee had been discussing this project when our Key Society committee said they also wanted to make a gift. With both groups involved, it reinforces just how excited we are by this project and what it means for the future of Hastings."

The Hastings Community Foundation grants program is funded by an endowed fund. The Key Society is an annual giving club that makes philanthropic contributions to projects that better the quality of life in Hastings.

While this is the largest gift made by the HCF, the foundation's support of the local YMCA is nothing new.

"The HCF and the Hastings Family YMCA have had a great working relationship for many years," said Stickles. "They have been extremely supportive of the YMCA mission and our desire to help everyone participate in YMCA programs."

Three Strategies for Philanthropy in a Volatile Market

When it comes to stock market performance, there are only two things that are guaranteed - the market will go down and the market will go up. How do you reach your charitable goals when the market is in flux? Here are three suggestions:



Align Your Goals

Do you use an investment account to achieve annual charitable giving goals? If so, make sure the level of investment risk matches your charitable goals. A high desire to meet specific charitable donation amounts may require you to reevaluate the level of risk in your chosen investment strategy.



Gift Assets Over Cash

It can be difficult to know when to cash out stock in order to fund a charitable donation. You can potentially avoid the uncertainty of trying to time the market by gifting appreciated assets, instead of cash. The process can have the same charitable tax advantages as gifting cash, but allows the donor to repurchase the security, thereby establishing a new cost basis and eliminating taxable gains on the security.



Utilize a Donor Advised Fund

You can think of a Donor Advised Fund (DAF) as an investment account for your charitable giving. A DAF with the Hastings Community Foundation can be established with a gift of cash or stock. Once created, the HCF invests the fund, eliminating stress for you. (Our investment process includes a thorough policy for our investment managers.) You can potentially receive charitable tax benefits each time you contribute to the fund, but a DAF allows you to make charitable distributions over time.


